What is PHX At Your Service?

The city program PHX At Your Service (PAYS) is an online reporting and request tool that can be used on desktop computers, tablets and smart phones and offers an easy-to-navigate button design to submit reports and requests. The system includes a ticket system with unique online user accounts. In May 2017, Phase 1 launched with 13 issues types to report through the Portal. Phase 2 launched in Jan. 2018 and added the most popular requests for the Water and Public Works Departments, including Start or Stop Water Service, and Trash and Recycling Containers. The entire project furthers the city's goal of creating a modern, centralized one-stop reporting system. To learn more about the program and installation of the app, click here.

NORTHWEST EXTENSION PHASE II

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE Week of Feb. 1



The Northwest Extension Phase II (NWEII) project will extend light rail west on Dunlap Avenue from 19th Avenue, then north on 25th Avenue and across I-17 on Mountain View Road with a terminus on the west side of the freeway near Metrocenter Mall. Northwest Extension Phase II light rail project construction is underway by the project contractor, Kiewit-McCarthy, A Joint Venture (KMJV) and third-party utility companies, such as Salt River Project (SRP).

Dunlap Avenue

- 23rd Avenue: Townley to Dunlap Avenues: KJMV is performing underground utility relocation just south of the 23rd and Dunlap avenues intersection, closing the street to northbound traffic. Traffic restrictions will be in place 24/7 through Mon., Feb. 8 at 5:00 p.m. Click here for more information.
- Dunlap Avenue between 19th and 25th avenues: KMJV and SRP are performing underground utility relocation and roadway construction on Dunlap Avenue between 19th and 25th avenues during day and nighttime hours. Traffic lanes will be located on the south side of Dunlap Avenue and restricted to one west- and one eastbound lane. Traffic restrictions will be in place 24/7 through Mon., May 31 at 5 a.m. Click here for more information.

25th Avenue

- [UPDATE] 25th Avenue between Dunlap Avenue and Mountain View Road: KJMV is performing underground utility relocation and roadway construction on 25th Avenue between Dunlap Avenue and Mountain View Road during day and nighttime hours. Traffic lanes will be located on the west side of 25th Avenue and restricted to one north- and one southbound lane. Traffic restrictions will be in place 24/7 through Fri., Feb. 22 at 5 a.m. Click here for more information.
- Rose Mofford Sports Complex and Dog Park: KMJV is replacing drainage infrastructure in and adjacent to Rose Mofford Sports Complex and Dog Park. The work will involve removing fencing on the southwest corner of the dog park. Temporary fencing will be placed, allowing continued use of the park during construction. In addition, available parking areas will change throughout the process. The Rose Mofford Sports Complex and Dog Park will remain open during this work. The work will be completed in late spring 2021. Click here for more information.

What is Valley Metro doing to address the COVID-19 pandemic for transit riders?

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, Valley Metro has enacted a number of policies and procedures to keep our riders and operators safe. Our new protocols include enhanced, daily cleaning of buses, trains, stops and stations, fogging of buses and light rail trains with high-grade disinfectant and HVAC cabin filters sanitized with high grade disinfectant.



Additionally, the agency Installed protective barriers for bus operators, and light rail operators are protected with seats nearest the cab blocked off to passengers. Finally, we implemented rear door boarding's on all local and express buses and limit bus boarding's to maintain social distancing. Face coverings are required on all Valley Metro vehicles, at stops and stations. To date, the agency has given out approximately 27,000 face coverings to transit riders.



Phoenix Launches Second Mobile Testing Van



The city of Phoenix launched its second COVID-19 mobile testing van (Van #2) Tuesday with an announcement from Phoenix Mayor Kate Gallego, and the city's medical partner in this new endeavor, <u>Premier Labs Solutions</u>. The announcement of Van #2 was held at Cielito Park, on N. 35th and W. Campbell avenues, the location of Van #2's first official day of operations.

Like Van #1, this new unit will offer COVID-19 antigen testing with rapid results, as well as Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) testing with results emailed to the individual in 1 to 2 days for added assurance.

There are no out-of-pocket-costs for individuals, with or without medical insurance. Van #2 will operate three days a week—Monday or Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday—from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

While Van #1's goal is to make COVID-19 testing accessible to Phoenix's underserved communities, Van #2 will focus on bringing accessible testing to areas in the city considered to be "hot spots," or areas that are showing a higher incidence of reported COVID-19 cases.

<u>Premier Lab Solutions</u>, a local Phoenix company that delivers convenient lab testing services to various businesses and organizations nationwide, will manage the daily operations of Van #2, administer COVID-19 tests to the community, as well as disseminate results to individuals. In determining locations for Van #2, Premier Lab Solutions will work closely with city of Phoenix staff and Mayor and Council Offices to determine where the "hot spots" are in the city.

Van #2 is a slightly larger van – a 2020 Ford T-350 Transit, customized by the Phoenix Public Works Department's Fleet Management division with an externally mounted generator, A/C unit, refrigerator, USB ports, a foldable work desk and service windows.

Other City-supported Accessible COVID-19 Tests

Additionally, a new, city-supported COVID-19 fixed site testing service will begin the week of Feb. 8. The static site will be at Maryvale Park, 4420 N. 51st Ave. and will operate three days a week – Monday, Wednesday and Thursday – from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. The tests will be administered by the city's existing medical partner, Vincere Cancer Center, and will offer rapid PCR tests to community members at no out-of-pocket-cost.

Other testing services supported by the city include:

• ExpresCheck at Sky Harbor International Airport, which offers three types of COVID-19 tests to travelers-- a PCR test, a blood antibody test and a Rapid Abbott ID test with results while you wait.

- Drive-thru testing services, implemented in late May 2020, which are offered on the weekends at various locations in Phoenix. Testing is administered by city partners, <u>Equality Health</u> Foundation and Family Tree Healthcare
- Mobile Testing Van #1, launched in mid-August 2020, which offers antigen and antibody tests with rapid results. Testing is administered by Vincere Cancer Center.

Testing services are available to members of the community at no out-of-pocket-cost.

All testing services offered by the city are supplemented by the CARES Act Relief Funds and in part, by the city of Phoenix.

HUMAN SERVICES

City Adds Shelter Beds, Invests in Solutions for Homelessness

The city of Phoenix is investing millions of dollars to meet the needs of those in our community experiencing homelessness. This includes efforts to not only assist those currently lacking shelter, but also those struggling to stay in their homes as the city works to provide more affordable housing options.

The city has committed \$20 million from the 2020-2021 fiscal budget and more than \$150 million in federal grant funding to these issues. The money is used to help thousands of Phoenicians find shelter, work and long-term solutions to the challenges of homelessness.



Maricopa County is home to nearly 7,500 individuals experiencing homelessness. More than half of those people lack adequate shelter, and that number is growing steadily. While this is a problem throughout the county and state, homelessness is principally addressed in the city of Phoenix and with local non-profit partners. There are approximately 1,800 shelter beds available in Maricopa County. Eighty-three percent of those are in the city of Phoenix.

By giving smart, you can be part of creating real, long-lasting change.

Phoenix Declares February Graffiti Free Awareness Month

Amid the COVID-19 health crisis, we are working together to safeguard our community by spending a lot more time at home and outside in our neighborhoods. We are witnessing changes in the ways we use our communities and the livability of neighborhoods has never been more important.

Every year, the Neighborhood Services Department (NSD) hosts #GraffitiFreePHX to encourage residents, neighborhoods and community volunteers to join the city in the effort to keep Phoenix graffiti free. Mayor Kate Gallego signed a proclamation marking the month of February the Annual Graffiti Free Phoenix Awareness Month.



Although it will look a little different this year, beginning Feb. 1, NSD will promote the "Graffiti Free Phoenix" program as they have done for the past six years.

Phoenix's NSD will color match and provide paint to neighbors wanting to responsibly practice 'distant socializing' that adhere to CDC recommendations of distance while helping to remove graffiti in their neighborhoods. In 2020, the city of Phoenix used 9,800 gallons of paint to cover over 47,988 graffiti sites across the entire city.

"Graffiti is a crime. Not only does graffiti damage the property that has been tagged, but it also lowers property values throughout the entire neighborhood. It has also been found that if graffiti isn't removed in a timely manner and allowed to stay visible, it will only attract more graffiti," explains Ginnie Ann Sumner, the co-chair of the Citizens Law Enforcement Anti-Graffiti Initiative, a group of Phoenix community leaders who partnered with police to combat graffiti.

However, studies show that if it's removed within 24 hours, its 90 percent less likely to return to the same area. If you see graffiti in progress, call 911 immediately, or if you would like to have it removed call NSD's Graffiti Busters at 602-534-4444.

Graffiti Busters will remove graffiti from properties with permission from property owners, but anyone can call in to report graffiti. NSD will verify that a permission slip is on file or obtain one from the owner. Each time graffiti is removed from the property, Graffiti Busters staff will provide the property owner with information on the program and offer free color-matched paint.

"We intend to remain strong and focused in our efforts of keeping our residents safe through COVID while making Phoenix a community of desirable neighborhoods," NSD Director Spencer Self said. "Our mission is to Preserve, Enhance, and Engage Phoenix Neighborhoods, but we need help from everyone. Report graffiti to us so we can keep Phoenix graffiti free."

NSD and its partners invites the community's help to spread the word about #GraffitiFreePHX by sharing on social media how you and your communities fight back against the vandalism and keep your neighborhood graffiti free.

"The #GraffitiFreePHX social media posts on Facebook and Twitter will continue to showcase the successes of our strong neighborhoods," Self said. "We hope people follow along on the NSD Facebook page, @PhxNeighborhood and share the tips and messages so we can share the collective efforts of Phoenicians keeping our city desirable and graffiti free."

PUBLIC TRANSIT

Face Coverings on Public Transit Now a Federal Mandate



On Jan. 21, 2021, President Biden issued an executive order requiring mask wearing on all modes of public transportation including intercity buses and trains. In addition, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) issued an order which requires people to wear masks while on all public transportation and conveyances (trains, airplanes, ferries, etc.) and at transportation hubs.

On Jan. 31, the Transportation Security Administration released a <u>security directive</u> to implement President Biden's Executive Order and support enforcement of the CDC's Order with an effective start date of Feb. 1, 2020, at 11:59 p.m. EST.

Since June 20, 2020, Phoenix Public Transit passengers have been required to wear face coverings in conjunction with local and regional declarations to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. This federal mandate takes precedence over previously enacted local actions.

Riders are urged to plan ahead and bring their own face coverings before boarding any public transit. Riders also are required to properly wear the face covering according to <u>CDC guidelines</u> for their entire trip, including covering the face and nose.

To assist transit passengers that do not have a face mask, Phoenix Public Transit will continue to provide free face coverings (as supplies allow) for riders at the following transit centers and libraries:

- Transit Centers: Central Station, Ed Pastor, Metrocenter and Sunnyslope
- Libraries: Burton Barr, Cesar Chavez, Desert Sage, Harmon, Palo Verde, Saguaro, Yucca

The face-covering requirement applies to all people two years of age and older, on any public transit vehicle or at any public transit facility, including waiting areas and bus and light rail stops. Guidance from the CDC instructs public transit personnel to use best efforts to ensure that every person wears a mask when boarding, disembarking and for the duration of travel. Best efforts include:

Boarding only those persons who wear masks.

- Instructing people that federal law requires wearing a mask on public transit and failure to comply constitutes a violation of federal law.
- Monitoring persons onboard for anyone who is not wearing a mask.
- At the earliest opportunity, disembarking any person who refuses to comply.
- Providing people with adequate notice to facilitate awareness and compliance of the requirement of the order to wear a mask.

In-Flight Fashion Lands at Sky Harbor

Style in the Aisle: Mid-Century Airline Identity is Phoenix Airport Museum's new exhibition that highlights the golden age of air travel. From hot pants and go-go boots to disposable paper dresses, the 1960s and 1970s were known for breaking fashion norms and traditions – even in the airline industry.

Visitors to Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport can view eight vibrant flight attendant uniforms, historic photographs and airline amenity objects. Highlights include Hughes Airwest's 1977 "sundance yellow" dress with matching bucket-style hat, American Airlines plaid "Americana" uniform with racoon-fur cap, and Trans World Airlines' (TWA) single-use, gold paper dress – part of the "Foreign Accents" collection.



Mid-century air travel had progressed into a posh experience and airlines built unique "brand identities" to set themselves apart. Each airline found new ways to attract passengers with amenities like onboard movies, gourmet meals and glamorous flight attendants.

Discover what in-flight service was like through items on display including fine china, themed cocktail swizzle sticks, a first-class menu featuring caviar and lobster, and an ashtray with a lighter complete with airline logos. Stow your tray table and visit the museum exhibition, located in two display cases at Terminal 4, level 2 near ticketing through October 2021.



CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

To date, Water Services staff have assisted 2,069 accounts for a total of \$1,167,906.81 of \$2 million through Project Assist. Water Services staff are averaging 100 customer contacts per day.

On Jan. 25, Housing staff completed the purchase and took possession of the Holiday Inn North Phoenix, 12027 N. 28th Dr., for the future home of US Vets. The hotel has 174 rooms, a restaurant conference rooms, fitness center and pool. The Housing staff are working with contractors to service and repair all major systems in preparation for US Vets to take ownership and move their operations in March or April.

Legislative

On Jan. 28, Government Relations staff participated on a call with the White House Office of Intergovernmental Affairs regarding the President's American Rescue Plan to target federal resources for economic relief for people affected by the pandemic.

Government Relations staff have identified available grant funding opportunities and is reviewing funds to determine if the city is eligible to apply and will share with corresponding city departments.

Economic Development & Education

Communications staff are sharing content all month long to celebrate Black History Month on social media and PHXTV. PHXTV will feature 15 new programs profiling historical leaders, Gold Medal Award Winner Jesse Owens, archived Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. audio tapes, and a former Harlem Globe Trotter. Additionally, PHXTV Classroom will premiere two news pieces covering laptop distributions and Teen Dating Violence.

Communications and the Office of Environmental Programs staff are promoting the Climate Action Plan survey to gain insights from residents on climate actions. The survey is available at phoenix.gov/oep/climate and closes Feb. 28.

Arts and Culture and Parks and Recreation staff met to review and discuss the Parks Capital Improvement Projects and future public art projects as part of the annual Public Art Plan. Arts and Culture and Planning and Development staff will meet to discuss the coordination of art in private development proposals and requests from private developers.

During the week of Jan. 25, Youth and Education staff finalized the logistics of deploying 38 volunteers within four partnering schools in the Creighton and Fowler school districts. Volunteer tutors will provide virtual one-on-one reading tutoring to second- and third-grade students, who have been identified by their school's literacy coaches to participate and receive the literacy services.

This month, Aviation Museum staff will showcase the Arizona Watercolor Association exhibition at Terminal 4, level 3 near the food court area. In honor of Black History month, an Arizona Black Aviators exhibition is displayed in Terminal 3.

On Feb. 5, the PHX Sky Train construction will lead to a lane closure along the airport entrance ramp from the I-10 Freeway onto eastbound Sky Harbor Blvd.

On Jan. 26, the Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management staff attended the four-hour virtual Cactus League 2021 Tabletop Exercise focusing on coordination between public and private sector

stakeholders, pre-incident and incident intelligence and information sharing protocols, and public and private sector emergency response plans.

On Jan. 26, the Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management staff participated in the Urban Areas Security Initiative Area Working Group meeting. The 2021 Homeland Security Grant Program was discussed, and Maricopa County Emergency Management provided an update on the Securing the Cities grant and organizational changes, 2019 reallocation funds, and 2020 cybersecurity funds in the amount of \$221,000.

Neighborhoods and Livability

On Jan. 28, the Office of Environmental Programs and CHISPA AZ co-hosted their third English/Spanish workshop to discuss the climate action plan focusing on the heat sector. Over 50 participants attended the workshop which outlined the impacts that increasing heat from climate change will have on Phoenix residents. The workshop outlined city efforts to limit and adapt to heat related changes. Aviation, Public Works and the Office of Sustainability staff assisted and facilitated the breakout sessions.

On Feb. 10, the Office of Environmental Programs staff will present to the American Society of Civil Engineers on the City's Climate Action Plan. On Feb. 20, the Office of Environmental Programs staff will present the Climate Action Plan to a youth-oriented workshop.

Planning and Development staff have expedited plan reviews and inspections in preparation of vaccine storage facilities for Mayo Clinic Hospital and Langham Logistics. The plan review process, which is normally performed in-house, was accommodated in the field. Staff helped contractors work through issues and get the approval of plans immediately in order to get the vaccine freezers up and running and ready for shipments. Over the past year, staff have worked in similar capacities to help expedite a COVID-19 research lab at 5020 N. Black Canyon Road and an N95 mask manufacturing facility at 2145 S. 7th St.

Social Services

On Jan. 27, Housing staff distributed 70 tablets to seniors on the fifth of eight total distribution days at Maryvale Parkway Terrace.

On Feb. 2, Housing staff hosted a free community spay and neuter clinic at Aeroterra Community Center. Thirty-five companion animals were given free sterilization and vaccine services by Dr. Kelly's Mobile Unit and Fix, Adopt, Save.

On Feb. 2, Housing Supportive Services and Valle de Sol provided COVID-19 tests to residents of Deck Park Vista Apartments.

During the week of Jan. 25., Human Services staff conducted 1,897 wellness checks for senior center members and delivered 2,845 meals.

Human Services staff have distributed over 4,600 COVID-19 vaccine fact sheets via mail, email and meal delivery packages to senior center members. The fact sheets were created in collaboration with Human Services and the Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management staff and are available in English, Spanish and Chinese and can be found on phoenix.gov/newsroom/em-and-hs/1561.

On Jan. 27, four couples and residents from Montebello Assisted Living participated in the virtual biweekly Memory Café. The Memory Café supports the City's Dementia Friendly Initiative for members with early signs of Dementia and their caregivers to engage interactively. Last week, in partnership with St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance, library staff served 511 meals to children and teens ages 18 and under. The Kid's Café program is the result of a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture administered by the Arizona Department of Education. Meals are being provided Monday through Saturday during curbside pickup hours at select library branches.

To date, Library staff has provided curbside pickup services to more than 220,000 customers with approximately 2,090,000 physical library materials circulated by library cardholders.

Water Services partnered with the Northern Arizona Forest Foundation and the Nature Conservancy on efforts for forest restoration to improve the Salt and Verde rivers watersheds. One of the programs from the partnership "Wood for Life" was featured in an article discussing how wood products from forest restoration projects were delivered to indigenous communities who burn the wood for heat. The article is featured at slate.com.

Infrastructure

On Jan. 27, Water Services staff hosted the first of four Proposed Water Rate Increase virtual meetings. The newsroom featured a story about the water rate increase at <u>phoenix.gov/newsroom</u>.

On Jan. 22, Water Services staff at the 91st Ave. Wastewater Treatment Plant Tres Rios found an injured pelican. Liberty Wildlife, a non-profit organization, assisted in removing the fishing lure binding the pelican's feet and brought the pelican to their facility for rehabilitation.

Water Services staff have begun rehabilitation on the PVC lined concrete sewer at 39th and Glendale avenues. The rehabilitation includes 19 pipe segments, six manholes, and installation of eight new manholes.

From Feb. 13-26, and March 13-26, the light rail will run on temporary schedule changes and station closures. Public Transit staff have updated the PHXNewsroom page, social media and Phoenix at Your Service newsletter with the schedule changes.

The December 2020 Valley Metro Ridership Report indicates declining ridership in Phoenix. The local bus ridership has declined by 49 percent, Express/RAPID ridership has declined by 91 percent, and light rail has declined by 65 percent.

Street Transportation staff is expected to begin construction for the Oak St Bike project at the end of February. Street Transportation staff will implement bicycle and pedestrian improvements along Oak St. from 3rd St. to the State Route-51 and connect to the Grand Canal. Improvements include bike lanes, streetlights, sidewalk, ADA-compliant ramps, pavement resurfacing, curb and gutters and a new High-Intensity Activated Crosswalk (HAWK) signal at the intersection of 7th and Oak streets.

Street Transportation staff is working with the City of Tempe and the Arizona Department of Transportation to install 13 miles of fiberoptic infrastructure and associated Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) devices along Baseline Road from Loop 202 heading east to Interstate-10. The federally funded project will extend the city's real-time transportation management capability along the South Phoenix corridor to enable more consistent network routing for the City's ITS devices. The project's 60 percent design submittal is scheduled for the end of February.


