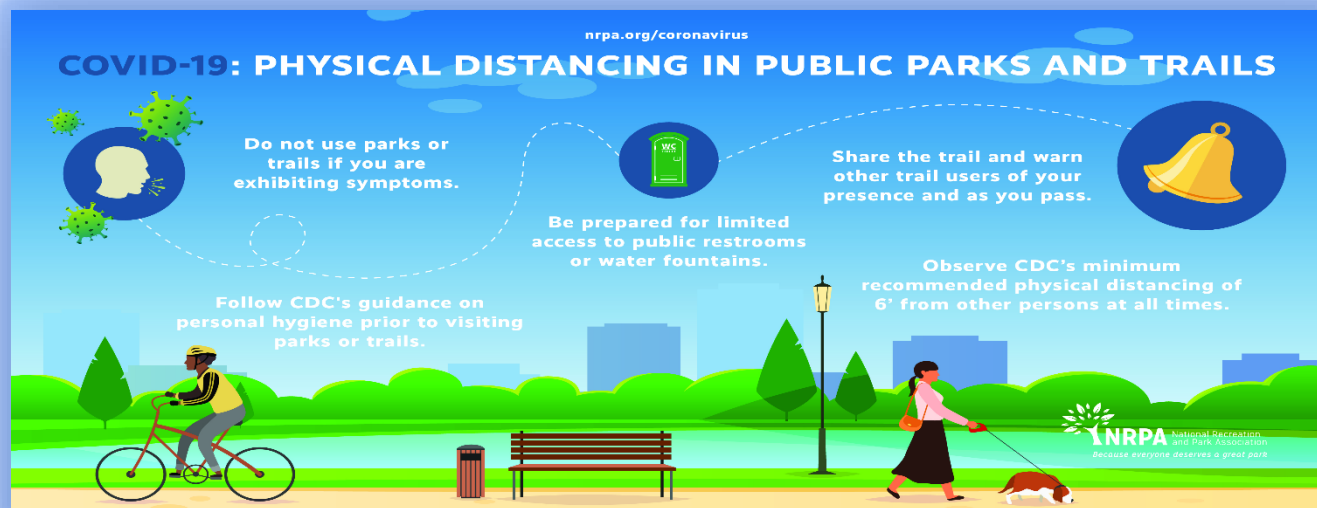

Successful candidates must adhere to company requirements:

- Small parts assembly, with the ability to work standing.
- Previous assembly, production, and manufacturing experience, however open to entry level capabilities.
- Meet and adhere to applicable Standard Operation Instructions (SOS/SCS) or any other related documents.
- Lifting is generally at or below 35Lbs. without significant repetitions.
- Employee will be part of the manufacturing process including assembly of products, machine operation and moderate material handling.

Which Parks and Recreation Department facilities are open and available for use?

The city of Phoenix has one of the largest recreation systems in the nation. The city's 185 flatland parks are open normal hours of operation, including use of the following amenities:

- Pickleball courts (limited access)
- Benches
- Drinking fountains
- Disc golf
- 12 dog parks
- 8 golf courses (restrictions at course restaurants)
- 7 skate parks

PHOENIX PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT REMOTE VIDEO INSPECTION PROGRAM

The Phoenix Planning and Development Department initiated a new Residential Remote Video Inspection Program on April 13, 2020. PDD staff had planned to finalize testing the program and offer it to customers in late Spring of 2020, but the department moved up the start date to assist customers during the COVID-19/Coronavirus outbreak.



Under the program, customers and residents can use a cell-phone to send a live video feed of completed work to an office-based inspector to review the work and sign off on the inspection. The customer will be able to set up the inspection at a specific prescheduled time. Remote video inspections will be available for the 12 commonly requested residential permit types listed below:

- Main breaker “de-rate” for photovoltaic (solar) panel installations
- Electrical service upgrades (up to 200 AMP)
- Electric meter socket replacement
- Minor electrical work
- Water heater replacement
- Minor plumbing work
- Plumbing, Repipe 1 Bathroom
- Plumbing, Repipe 2 Bathrooms
- Plumbing, Repipe 3+ Bathrooms
- Repair/replace gas line
- Gas clearance
- Sewer lines

Remote video inspections allow customers to make specific inspection appointments, freeing them from multi-hour arrival windows that are necessary for in-person inspections. APRIL 1 WAS CENSUS DAY! HAVE YOU BEEN COUNTED?



The importance of completing the Census now is incredibly key to supporting our community now and in the future. Participating in the Census assists the city in obtaining funding that provides vital resources, programs and services such as housing, transportation, education, public safety, and so much more for the city of Phoenix, and can be easily done just by filling out the online Census form.

You should have already received a code in the mail that you can use to complete the Census form for your household online at <https://my2020census.gov/>. You'll be asked basic demographic questions about your household, including how many people are living in the home; if your home is owned or rented, and about the age, sex, race, and relationships of the people who are in the household.

“Participation in the Census is critical for Phoenix, because it impacts our funding across so many areas for years to come,” said Albert Santana, the city’s Census Director. “The form only takes ten minutes to complete, so it is one of the simplest ways to ensure that we have the resources we need to operate.”



55 PROGRAMS

Census data helps with the allocation of federal funding across 55 programs, including the National School Lunch Program, Federal Student Loan programs, and many more.

In Phoenix, an accurate 2020 Census count represents \$533 per person, or approximately \$866 million a year. The campaign highlights the ways that an accurate count in the census supports local governments, and provides information on how to respond to the census online, by phone or by mail; what residents should look for when receiving communication from the federal government about the Census; and a variety of Frequently-Asked-Questions.



\$2,959 EACH

For every person counted, from infants to young children to older adults, the State of Arizona receives \$2,959 from the federal government. This amount adds up to more than \$20 billion annually for Arizona. The more people counted, the more money each community stands to receive.

PHOENIX PUBLIC TRANSIT AND REGION PROMOTES SOCIAL DISTANCING ON BUSES



Beginning Monday, April 13, seating on all bus routes is limited to support social distancing measures between passengers. These measures were approved by the Phoenix City Council on April 6 to help reduce the spread of COVID-19 and for the safety of all community members.

Passenger limits will be as follows, with exceptions for wheelchair and mobility aid users as needed:

- Maximum of five (5) passengers on smaller neighborhood circulator vehicles (ALEX, MARY, SMART routes)
- Maximum of ten (10) passengers on a regular 40-foot bus
- Maximum of fifteen (15) passengers on a 60-foot articulated (bendy type) bus

Should vehicle capacity be reached, bus operators may not allow additional boardings until additional capacity becomes available. In such cases, passengers may need to wait for the next bus.

The city of Phoenix and Valley Metro, who also operates bus services in the metro area, are coordinating a regional effort to further educate riders on social distancing while on board public transportation. The signage that will be added to buses will be consistent for passengers across this region.

Passengers are encouraged to plan additional travel time, as these measures may impact their trip.

Passengers are also reminded to use public transit only for necessary trips. We ask everyone to continue to practice social distancing while riding, including:

- boarding using the rear doors,
- visually showing fare to the driver,
- staying at least six feet apart while waiting at bus stops and
- in accordance with CDC guidance, wearing a cloth mask covering their nose and mouth.

Recognizing there is currently a lower demand, public transit is nonetheless a critical service for many essential service workers in our communities. We are working to ensure that those who depend on transit can continue using our system and get to their destinations safely. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation during these times.

Light Rail, Express, RAPID Bus Service Schedules Reduced Due to COVID-19

Express and RAPID commuter bus route schedules will continue to operate on a reduced schedule, and will operate fewer trips each weekday morning and evening. Riders should check valleymetro.org for trip planning. This is a proactive step to maintain local bus route service for those who fully rely on public transit for critical trips.

There has been less demand for commuter trips, and we are reallocating our skilled workforce of operators, supervisors and maintenance workers to focus on our local bus routes at this time.

Beginning Saturday, April 11, **light rail** will be on the same schedule Monday-Saturday, 15-minute frequency 4 a.m.-6 p.m. with no late-night service on Friday and Saturday. Sunday service will remain the same. Local bus, circulators, and paratransit continue to operate on regular schedules.

Phoenix Transit Centers

Customer service windows at the following Phoenix transit centers will remain closed until further notice:

- Central Station (Central Avenue and Van Buren Street)
- Ed Pastor (Central Avenue and Broadway Road)
- Sunnyslope (3rd Street and Dunlap Avenue)
- Metrocenter (Metrocenter Mall)

Various options for purchasing fares remain available to passengers, such as ticket vending machines located throughout light rail platforms, at [participating retailers](#) or [online](#).

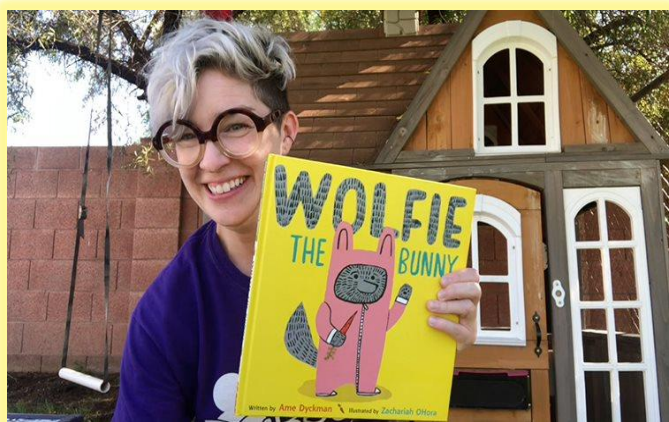

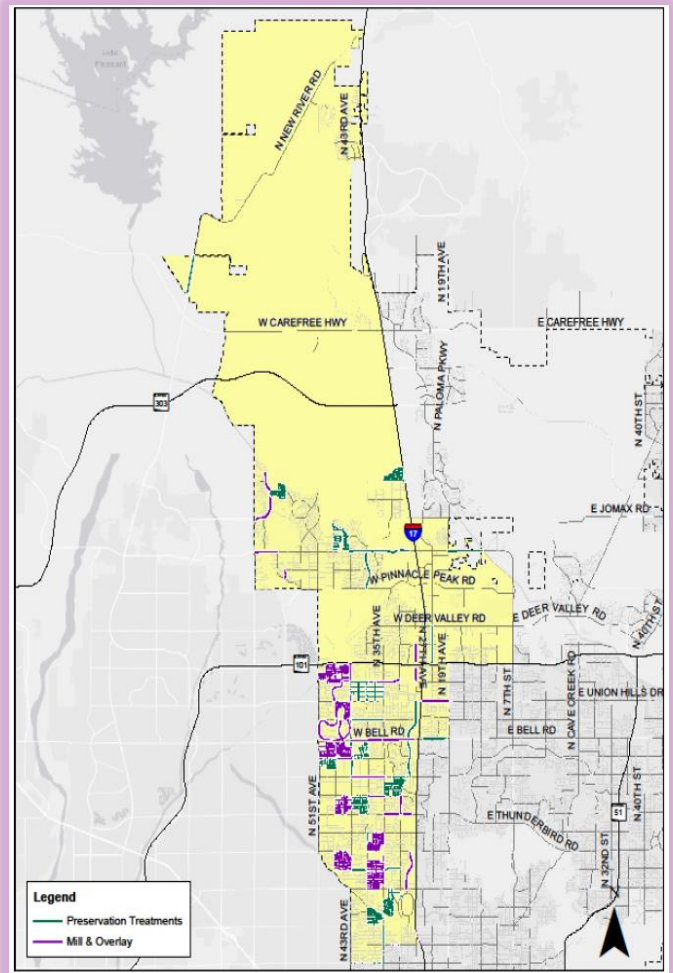
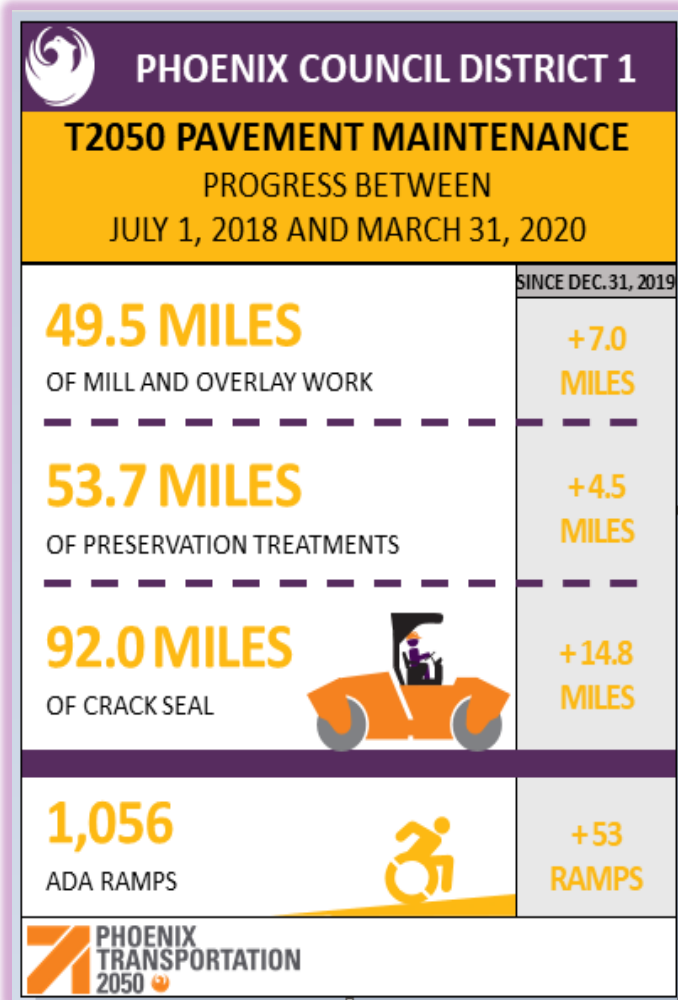

COUNCIL DISTRICT 1 PROGRESS REPORT FOR MARCH 2020

On December 3, the Mayor, Councilmembers, City Manager, contractors and staff celebrated the end of the 2019 paving season. Preparation work for 2020 paving continued throughout the winter with crack sealing, ADA ramp, sidewalk and drainage construction. Paving got underway in early March 2020. This month's report covers work performed from December 31, 2019 through March 31, 2020. The right column on the infographic below shows cumulative activity since December 31, 2019. Hereafter, the right column will reflect activity since the prior month's report.



UPCOMING PAVEMENT MAINTENANCE

In April, the following streets are scheduled for either a pavement maintenance treatment or work such as crack seal or concrete ramps in preparation for pavement maintenance that will take place later this year. *Note: Planned treatment and work schedules are subject to change.*

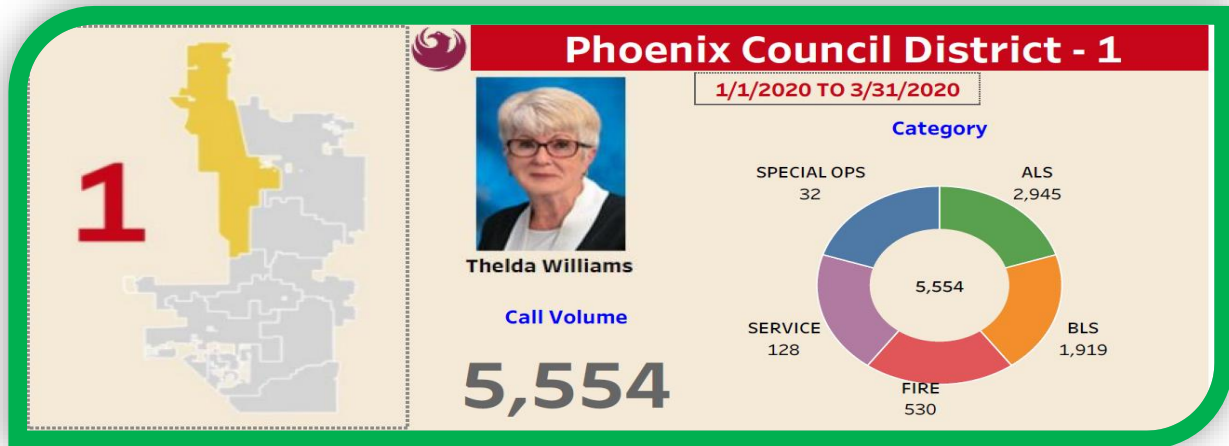
PHOENIX INTERACTIVE STREET CLOSURE & RESTRICTIONS MAP – UPDATED APRIL 17.

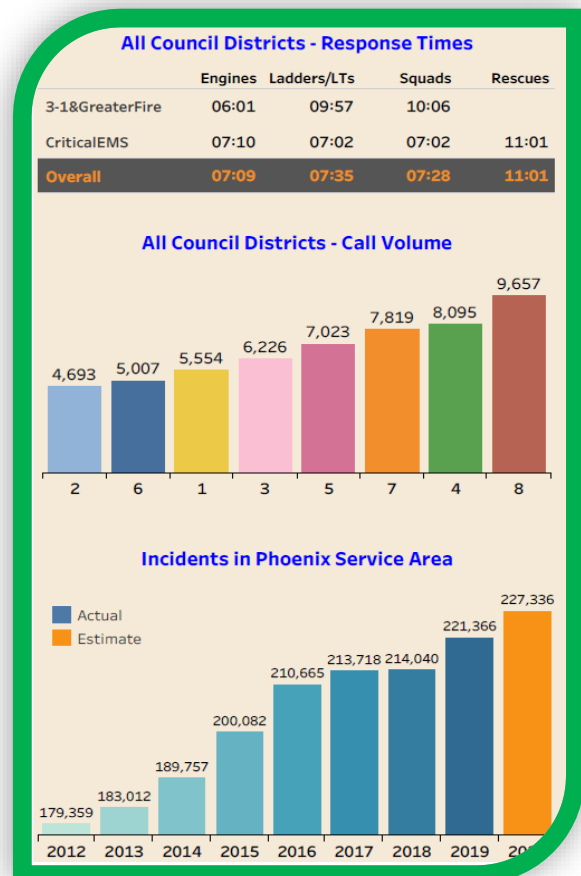
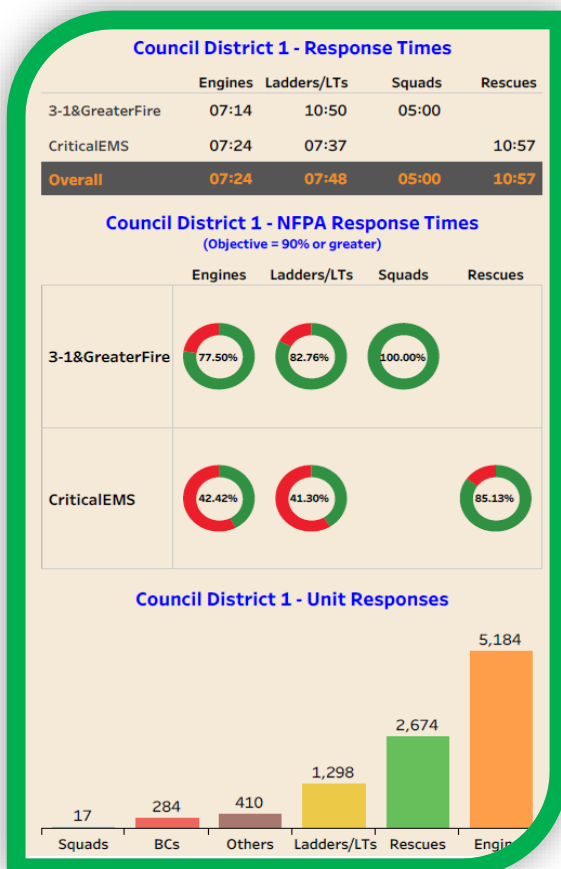

PLAN ON I-17 WEEKEND CLOSURES IN PHOENIX PAVEMENT SEALING

Southbound I-17 Closed Saturday; Northbound On Sunday

Stretches of Interstate 17 in Phoenix will be closed this weekend while crews apply an asphalt sealant to refresh and extend the life of the freeway's pavement.



The fog sealing, which the Arizona Department of Transportation has done along several other sections of Valley freeways in recent years, will be done along southbound I-17 on Saturday, April 18, and along northbound I-17 on Sunday, April 19, in areas between 19th Avenue near downtown and Peoria Avenue in the Metrocenter area.

The length of each closure will be adjusted as the work progresses on Saturday and Sunday. Crews will be prepared to reopen stretches of the freeway as they complete the fog sealing. Drivers should plan on using alternate routes while the following I-17 closures are in place:

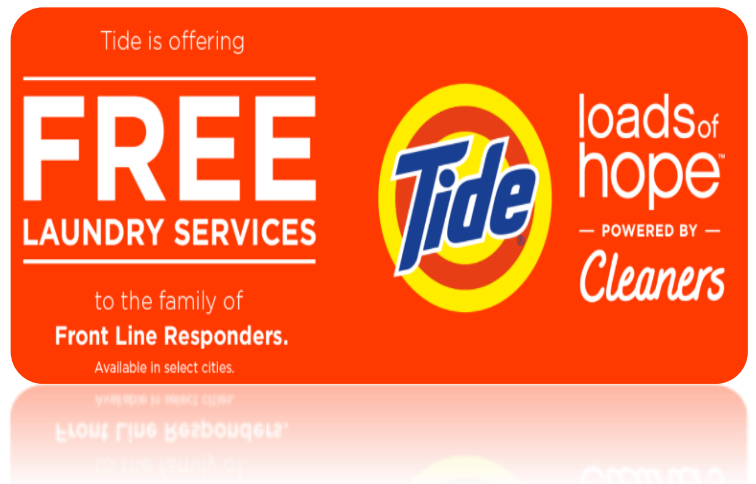
- **Southbound I-17 closed between Dunlap and 19th avenues from 11:30 p.m. Friday to 5 p.m. Saturday**, April 18, for asphalt sealing. Southbound on- and off-ramps closed in the area. **Both I-10 ramps to southbound I-17 at the “Stack” interchange closed. DETOUR:** Allow extra travel time and consider exiting ahead of the closure and using alternate routes. Alternate freeway routes include eastbound Loop 101 (Pima Freeway) to southbound State Route 51 to travel to I-10 near downtown Phoenix.
- **Northbound I-17 closed between 19th and Peoria avenues from 11:30 p.m. Saturday to 5 p.m. Sunday**, April 19, for asphalt sealing. Northbound on- and off-ramps closed in the area. **Both I-10 ramps to northbound I-17 at the “Stack” interchange closed. DETOUR:** Allow extra travel time and consider exiting ahead of the closure and using alternate routes. Optional routes include either Loop 101 freeways (Pima or Agua Fria) in the East or West Valley areas. Drivers also can consider using westbound I-10 starting at the “Split” interchange near Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport to northbound State Route 51 to reach north Phoenix destinations.

Fog sealing involves the use of specialized tanker trucks that spray a liquid asphalt emulsion on the freeway pavement. The process has been used with positive results in recent years on sections of I-10 and Loop 303 in the West Valley, Loop 202 (Santan Freeway) in the East Valley as well as segments of Loop 101 (Agua Fria and Pima freeways).

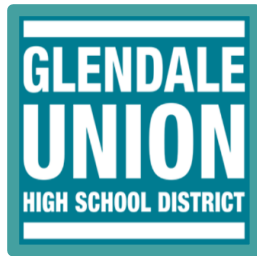
