


#### Northwest Extension Phase II Construction Update

The Northwest Extension Phase II (NWEII) project will extend light rail west on Dunlap Avenue from 19th Avenue, then north on 25th Avenue and across I-17 on Mountain View Road with a terminus on the west side of the freeway near Metrocenter Mall.

Northwest Extension Phase II light rail project construction is underway by the project contractor, Kiewit-McCarthy, A Joint Venture (KMJV) and third-party utility companies, such as Salt River Project (SRP).

- 25th Avenue between Dunlap Avenue and Mountain View Road: KJMV is performing underground utility relocation and roadway construction on 25th Avenue between Dunlap Avenue and Mountain View Road during day and nighttime hours. Traffic lanes will be located on the west side of 25th Avenue and restricted to one north- and one southbound lane. Traffic restrictions will be in place 24/7 through Fri., Jan. 29, 2021 at 5 a.m. Click here [t.e2ma.net] for more information.
- **[UPDATE]** Dunlap Avenue between 19th and 25th avenues: KMJV and SRP are performing underground utility relocation and roadway construction on Dunlap Avenue between 19th and 25th avenues during day and nighttime hours. Traffic lanes will be located on the south side of Dunlap Avenue and restricted to one west- and one eastbound lane. Traffic restrictions will be in place 24/7 through Mon., May 31, 2021 at 5 a.m. <u>Click here [t.e2ma.net]</u> for more information.
- Rose Mofford Sports Complex and Dog Park: replacing **KMJV** is drainage infrastructure in and adjacent to Rose Mofford Sports Complex and Dog Park. The work will involve removing fencing on the southwest corner of the dog park. Temporary fencing will be placed, allowing continued use of the park during construction. In addition, available parking areas will change throughout the process. The Rose Mofford Sports Complex and Dog Park will remain open during this work. #### Other Area Projects

The Arizona Department of Transportation is constructing improvements to the cross-street drainage system along the I-17 frontage road between Greenway Road and Dunlap Avenue in Phoenix. The purpose of the project is to improve the drainage facilities that remove storm runoff from the Greenway, Thunderbird, Cactus and Peoria cross streets, helping to reduce the potential for flooding at the I-17 overpasses.

## **CALL TO ACTION**

Phoenix residents are being asked to explore and participate in the budget process and submit their budget comments. To access the budget tool visit <u>FundPHX</u> and click on the Try the Tool tab to engage in the City's annual budgeting process.

An essential part of planning for the city of Phoenix is the development of its annual budget every year. The more than \$1.4 billion General Fund operating budget includes everything from police and fire services, to parks, libraries, and senior services. With a budget this size, supporting the fifth largest city in the country and 1.7 million residents, it can be a challenge to understand everything that goes into the services you receive. To help residents better understand how our budget is created, the Budget & Research Department has added a new tool to gather feedback and help you see what makes Phoenix run.

#### PARKS AND RECREATION

The Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department will lift its annual ban of open fires in the city's desert parks and mountain preserves on Tuesday, Dec. 1.

Typically lifted during the month of October, the ban was extended this year due to the unseasonably warm and dry fall weather. Park users are reminded that vegetation in these areas remains dry and caution

should be taken any time they are using an open fire.

In consultation with the Phoenix Fire Department, the ban went into effect on May 1, and prohibits open wood and charcoal fires. Propane or gas grills are not part of the ban but can only be used in established picnic areas.



The ban applies to Camelback Mountain, Deem Hills Recreation

Area, Papago Park, Phoenix Mountains Park and Recreation Area, Phoenix Mountains Preserve, Phoenix Sonoran Preserve, North Mountain Park, Rio Salado Habitat Restoration Area, and South Mountain Park/Preserve. It does not apply to the city's flatland parks.

Motorists traveling through or near Phoenix's desert parks and mountain preserves should use extreme care with smoking materials and dispose of those only in their vehicle's ash tray. Smoking outside an enclosed vehicle is prohibited year-round in those natural areas.

To protect their homes, residents whose property borders the city's preserve land may remove dry shrubs, brush and grasses, and trim dead branches from trees within the 10-foot strip of land that borders their property. By creating this 10-foot "buffer zone" residents can help to protect their homes from potential brush fires in the adjacent preserve land.

Preserve neighbors also should check irrigation lines and pool back-flush hoses to ensure that water is not seeping into the preserve. Outside water sources encourage unnaturally dense vegetation growth, which increases fire risk.

## PHOENIX SKY HARBOR



Like so many things this year, Thanksgiving travel is going to look and feel different from previous years. It is usually one of the busiest travel holidays at our Airport and this year, while a little different, will no doubt still be a busy Thanksgiving weekend.

If you are planning to travel out of town, here are some tips to keep in mind for a safe and stress-free trip:

- Tip #1 Use the 44th St. PHX Sky Train® Station to pick-up or drop-off travelers and avoid terminal curb congestion. The 44th St. PHX Sky Train® Station is centrally located and can easily be reached from highways, major streets, and the Valley Metro Rail. It features a <u>Cell Phone Waiting</u>
  <u>Lot</u> and it provides easy access to all airport terminals via the free <u>PHX Sky Train</u>®.
- Tip # 2 Check your flight status and security checkpoint wait times before arriving at the airport. Flight status can be checked with your airline and security checkpoint wait times are available on the homepage of <a href="skyharbor.com">skyharbor.com</a> and on the flight information displays at the airport once you arrive.
- Tip # 3 If you're planning to park at the airport, book your parking ahead of time with <a href="Sky Harbor Discount Parking">Sky Harbor Discount Parking</a> to save time and money. Our parking options provide you with the most convenient access to the terminals. Save money while arriving to the airport in the safety of your own vehicle and avoid the last-minute hassle of figuring out where to park.
- Tip #4 Be on the lookout for overhead freeway signs. The Wednesday before Thanksgiving is the busiest day of the year on our roadways. The signs will alert you to traffic, accidents and provide alternate routes where possible. Be sure to check <a href="www.az511.com">www.az511.com</a> for the latest traffic information.
- Tip #5 Review the TSA requirements for carry-on and checked baggage. It doesn't hurt to reference the TSA <u>Travel Checklist</u> and see what you can and can't pack in your suitcase including that turkey, stuffing and cranberry sauce.
- Tip # 6 Lastly, be sure to give yourself plenty of time. Plan to arrive at least two hours prior to your departure time and be sure to bring a face covering. Travelers are required to wear a face covering inside all airport facilities including the rental car shuttle buses. If you forget your face covering or need other personal protective equipment (PPE), you can purchase one at a PPE vending machine or at a retail store or find masks available outside the security checkpoints.

If you haven't traveled by air in the past eight months, you can find all the information you need about Sky Harbor's health and safety measures by visiting the <u>PHX – Here for You</u> page on skyharbor.com. We have implemented increased sanitization, including installing UV-C Light technology which constantly cleans escalator handrails. Restrooms provide touch-free handwashing facilities. We have also installed distancing markers and plexiglass barriers throughout our terminals. And face coverings are required throughout all public airport facilities for the safety of all travelers. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) also launched a <u>new online resource</u> for travelers to learn how to Fly Healthy during the holiday season. Have a safe and happy Thanksgiving.

Frontier airlines announces new nonstop service from phoenix to three California destinations: Oakland, Ontario, and Sacramento.

Low-fare carrier Frontier Airlines today announces new nonstop service from three Phoenix to California destinations: Oakland, Ontario, and Sacramento. To celebrate this new service, Frontier is offering lower fares, which are available now FlyFrontier.com. Service is seasonal and frequency and times are subject to change, so please check the website for the most updated schedule.



Frontier has been an industry leader in healthy travel initiatives and is currently the only U.S. airline conducting temperature screenings for all passengers and crew prior to boarding. Anyone with a temperature of 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit or higher will be denied boarding as a step to better protect other passengers while flying.

Additionally, in April, Frontier announced sweeping health and safety enhancements affecting every step of a customer's travel journey with the airline. Beginning with required face coverings that must be worn by all passengers and team members throughout every flight and a health acknowledgement. Prior to completing check-in via the company's website or mobile app, passengers are required to confirm that:

- Neither they nor anyone in their household has exhibited Covid-19 related symptoms in the last 14 days
- They will wash their hands/sanitize before boarding the flight
- They understand and acknowledge the airline's face covering policy and pre-boarding temperature screening policies

Frontier also introduced a fogging disinfectant to its already stringent aircraft cleaning and sanitation protocols, which provides a safe, certified disinfecting solution proven to be effective against viruses. The fogging includes virtually every surface in the passenger cabin. Planes are wiped down every night with additional disinfectant, as well.

During flight, main cabin air is a mix of fresh air drawn from outside and air that has been passed through an air filtration system that features HEPA filters capable of capturing respiratory virus particles at more than 99.9% efficiency – similar to those used in hospital environments. Frontier's modern all-Airbus fleet is among the youngest in the world - all aircraft currently in operation are less than four years old.

The foundation's Board of Directors, in partnership with Courtesy Chevrolet, is donating the three new Chevrolet Tahoe SUV's and one specially wrapped Chevrolet Camaro coup.

"The Phoenix Police Reserve officers are an integral component of the city's policing plan and work alongside the Phoenix Police Department to ensure the safety of the Phoenix residents," said Derrick Hall, president and CEO of the Arizona Diamondback and president of the PPRF Board of Directors.

"We're incredibly grateful for their contributions to the community and wanted to ensure they're not only receiving the recognition they deserve but also have the equipment needed to serve."

The Phoenix Police Reserve Foundation is an independent, nonprofit organization operated by a board of directors comprised of civic and business leaders within the community. The foundation works closely with Phoenix Police Department leadership within the Reserve Division.

The Phoenix Police Department Reserve Division is comprised of more than 120 sworn reserve police officers who independently perform the same police duties as full-time career police officers, on a volunteer basis. Reserve police officers are required to volunteer 240 hours of police services each year, attend four quarterly meetings, complete four special police enforcement events, and complete all police department training and proficiency requirements. Last year, these volunteer reserve police officers donated more than 39,000 hours of police services to the Phoenix community, which have a value of \$3.144M.

#### Reserve Officers Take to the Track



The <u>Phoenix Police Museum</u> is now open Tuesday through Thursday by tour appointment only. The museum will be following <u>CDC recommendations</u> to minimize risk to our visitors, volunteers, and employees.



# **CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:**

#### Economic Development & Education

Youth and Education staff has partnered with School Connect to provide up to 10,000 internet-enabled laptops to assist local schools in achieving a 1:1 student-to-device ratio for grades K-12 and closing the digital divide/technology gap. Using Coronavirus Relief Funds, the City has ordered 4,430 laptops for Phoenix students to access wi-fi for distant learning. The remaining laptops to be purchased for students will be acquired through a donation made to School Connect.

Aviation staff continue to package individual masks, provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, to distribute to travelers at Sky Harbor International Airport in Terminals 3 and 4, and the Rental Car Center. During the week of Nov. 5, staff distributed a total of 1,856 masks.

On Nov. 20, Aviation staff will celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the Navigator Volunteer Program. The celebration will be held in a drive-thru format, by which all 450 volunteers are invited to drive by in their personal vehicles to celebrate with staff and be recognized for their dedication and hours of service.

This week, Arts and Culture staff submitted the final awards for approved applicants of the Phoenix Arts and Culture Coronavirus Relief Program for Artists and Arts Professionals. Staff also communicated to all previous Phoenix Arts and Culture Coronavirus Relief Program organizational grantees that they are eligible for a small additional award. Those final awards will be made by the end of November. Both programs will close Dec. 2020.

During the week of Nov. 18, Convention Center staff will host 2,500 estimated attendees for The Salvation Army's annual Thanksgiving meal. In an effort to safely serve the community and prevent the spread of COVID-19, this year's event will not include a sit-down meal. All meals will be packaged for individuals to take with them. Salvation Army volunteers will also deliver more than 2,200 Thanksgiving meals to homebound residents this year.

#### **Social Services Delivery**

To date, the Library staff has provided curbside pickup services to more than 162,000 customers, with approximately 1.5 million physical library materials circulated by library cardholders.

This week, in partnership with St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance, Library staff served 651 meals to children and teens, ages 18 and under. The Kid's Café program is the result of a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture administered by the Arizona Department of Education. Meals are being provided, Monday through Saturday, during curbside pickup hours at select library branches.

During the week of Nov. 9, Human Services staff conducted 1,737 wellness checks and delivered 2,900 meals to 580 Senior Center members.

#### **Public Safety**

On Nov. 21, a Police Recruit written exam is scheduled at the Police Regional Academy for 89 applicants so far. Police recruitment remains open for applicants to register for written exams scheduled Nov. 21, Dec. 4, and Dec. 19, as well as the ongoing online option.

This week, Fire staff published a new standard operating procedure for high-rise building entry. In the Phoenix Region, a high-rise building is defined as 6 elevator stops or greater or 75 feet in height or higher. The new standard operating procedures include initial and ongoing building size-up, appropriate use of the risk management profile, assessment of occupant location and removal, and effective sectorization within the incident structure.

#### Neighborhoods and Livability

During the week of Nov. 9, the Parks and Recreation staff hosted three tournaments at sports complexes citywide. Staff hosted 508 allocations and 83 reservations on flat-land athletic fields citywide and scheduled 83 maintenance staff for 332 hours to conduct secondary cleaning on adjacent restrooms. During the week of Nov. 16, staff was scheduled to host 39 allocations.

#### Infrastructure

Information Technology staff developed a COVID-19 Relief Spend Tracker, which allows the public to track the City's Coronavirus Relief Fund spending. The tracker features a series of colorful datasets highlighting the life-to-date spend for each of the focus areas of the strategic plan. The dashboards, featured on Phoenix's <u>CARES Act and COVID-19 Relief Fund</u> public information page and <u>Phoenix Open Data</u> will be updated weekly.

SMALL BUSINESS SATURDAY: Nov. 28, 2020


# Citywide Updates Scan the Street for Wheels and Feet


