In July 2018, Officer Fluty went for a routine eye exam. His optometrist noticed something was not right and sent Fluty for an MRI. Two days later, he was having surgery to try to remove a level 4 glioblastoma from the right side of his brain.

Officer Fluty is a 22-year veteran of the Phoenix Police Department. His latest assignment was with the Desert Horizon Bike Squad. Before serving with Phoenix, Fluty was a Deputy with the Yavapai County Sheriff's Department for over 7 years. In addition to children, never leave pets alone in hot cars!



Phoenix Kicks Off 2019 Street Paving Season

City Crews Set to Triple the Number of Street Miles to be Paved Across Phoenix

This year's paving season, which will run through late fall based on weather conditions, is programmed to include the largest number of street miles to be paved in a single season.

Based on the Council-approved \$200 million advancement funded by future street

program revenues from <u>Transportation 2050</u>, the City is set to triple the number of arterial and major street miles in its annual pavement maintenance program over the next five years.





In addition to keeping the street network in a state of good repair and extending its lifespan, the City's street maintenance program also enhances the safety of the roadway and supports various mobility improvement efforts to help people get around town with greater ease.

Approximately 375 street miles are included in this year's pavement maintenance program.

All streets included in the pavement maintenance program for 2019 and 2020 are highlighted in an interactive

street maintenance map available at phoenix.gov/PavementProgram.

With the increase in pavement maintenance activity, area commuters will see an increase in street restrictions. City crews will work hard to ensure work zone restrictions are lifted in a timely manner to minimize traffic impacts. Area commuters are advised to use caution in work zones.
