Masks Required in City Buildings Regardless of Vaccination Status

On May 19, 2021, the Phoenix City Council updated the Face Coverings



information to automatically adjust with CDC guidance. On July 27, 2021, the CDC updated that guidance to require masking indoors in communities with substantial or high virus transmission rates, regardless of vaccination status. **Masks are now required in city buildings.** As previously decided by the Council, private businesses may set their own policies regarding face coverings applicable to their employees and customers. (Note: The airport and public transit remain covered by the Federal mask mandate.)

Monsoon Safety

Driving Tips

- Do not attempt to drive through a flooded road! The depth of water is not always obvious. The road bed may be washed out under the water, and you could be stranded or trapped.
- Six inches of water can cause most cars to lose control.
- Two feet of rushing water can carry away most vehicles including sport utility vehicles (SUVs) and pick-up trucks.
- Don't drive around barricades. Barricades are there for your protection. Turn around and go the other way.



- Treat non-working or flashing traffic signals at intersections as a four-way stop. Proceed with caution.
- If floodwaters rise around your car but the water is not moving, abandon the car and move to higher ground. Do not leave the car and enter moving water.
- Avoid camping or parking along streams, rivers, and creeks during heavy rainfall. These areas can flood quickly and with little warning. Flood Watch = "Be Aware." Conditions are right for flooding to occur in your area.

Phoenix Parks and Recreation Board Approves Pilot Program to Restrict Select Trails During Extreme Heat



The Phoenix Parks and Recreation Board approved a pilot program through which select city hiking trails will be closed when the National Weather Service issues an Excessive Heat Watch. The decision was made due to concerns for the safety of the public and first responders.

The pilot program will run until September 30, 2021, and during that time Camelback Mountain's Echo Canyon Trail and Cholla Trail, and all trails associated with Piestewa Peak Trailhead in the Phoenix Mountains Preserve will be closed from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on days when an Excessive Heat Watch is in effect. Please note that Camelback Mountain's Cholla

Trail is currently closed.


Those locations were chosen for the pilot program based on the number of mountain rescues that occur there annually, as well as the difficulty rating of those trails and how that impacts the complexity of the rescues.

During times when trail access will be restricted, parking lot gates will be closed, and signage will be posted. Closure information also will be communicated through the Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department's website and social media accounts, and to local resorts and hotels. Additionally, Phoenix Park Rangers will be visible at those locations to remind and educate trail users about the restrictions.

Deadline Extended for Community Input on Draft Climate Action Plan

The City of Phoenix is currently working to update its Climate Action Plan, which will serve as a long-term plan to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from local operations and community activities as well as prepare for the impacts of climate change.



The deadline for public input on the Draft Climate Action Plan has been extended through **August** 13.

Seniors - Learn How to Decrease the Risk of Falls and Increase Your Activity

Phoenix Public Library and The Area Agency on Aging present the Matter of Balance, a 9-week online program designed to invigorate and empower older adults at home. Matter of Balance will focus on multiple topics beginning with reducing fear and increasing control over falls at home. This program will encourage participants to set goals for increasing activity levels, make changes to reduce fall risks, and exercise to increase strength and balance.

The curriculum includes group discussions, mutual problem solving, role-play activities, exercise training, assertiveness training, and a few homework assignments. Additional topics Matter of Balance will cover includes home safety, positive strategies for change, planning personal action, and moving from self-defeating to self-motivating thought. The programs are for adults 60+ and family members or caretakers. The programs are free to attend, but registration is required.

Street Pavement Maintenance

Street Transportation crews continue working hard around District 3 and citywide!

In District 3 alone, crews have completed 88.1 miles of mill and overlay work, 120 miles of preservation treatments, 137.7 miles of crack seal, and 2,028 ADA ramps (from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2021).

Drought Pipeline Project

Construction on the 66-inch pipeline is underway and schedule to be complete in early 2023. The pipeline project that will connect to the new pump station on 31st Street south of Bell Road also began this week. Construction for the rehabilitation/replacement 48-inch pipeline is complete. This pipeline was repaired/replaced to avoid failure of the pipe, which carries 35 million gallons of tap water a day to North Phoenix.

To help keep community members updated on construction updates and alerts, the city has launched the Pipeline Project mobile app. The

Phoenix Awarded Grant for Veteran Services



Recently, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) awarded the City of Phoenix Law Department a \$2 million grant for its Veterans Court. This grant provides the City of Phoenix Veterans Court, in partnership with EMPACT-Suicide Prevention Services, funding to expand and enhance its current program of providing mental health, substance abuse, and social

services to veterans not eligible for the Veterans Administration (VA) Services.

The goal of Veterans Court is to restore veterans to being successful, contributing members of the community by ensuring that veterans entering the criminal justice system make contact with specific programs to address the root causes of the behavior that resulted in the veteran becoming a defendant in the criminal justice system. The target population consists of defendants (veterans) who served in the United States Armed Forces, who are experiencing treatable behavioral issues such as post-traumatic stress (PTS), traumatic brain injury (TBI), anger management, domestic violence, or substance and alcohol abuse.
