

Getting a permit gets easier

etting a permit with the city just got easier, and you may not even have to make a trip to Phoenix City Hall. The Planning & Development Department now offers 23 new online permits through the city website: phoenix.gov/pdd/onlineservices/online-permitting. The new expanded system includes residential, commercial and fire permits for minor work that is currently eligible for an over-the-counter permit with code compliance verified by the city inspector.

Five new residential permits will allow residents and contractors to do minor electrical and plumbing remodel work, including adding new circuits and pipes to a house. A residential field consultation permit also is being

added to allow residents to meet with an inspector on-site to ask technical questions about an upcoming project or get advice on how best to deal with non-permitted construction from a previous owner.

Eight new commercial permits are available online. The fire prevention permits include fire alarm and sprinkler system modifications, special egress control, fire alarm dialers and fire-line stub-outs.

The city's goal is to make the permitting process easier by providing online services 24/7, reducing wait times at the permit counter and facilitating private development.

Seeking City Hall volunteers to connect



n October, City Hall Connectors, a helpful group of volunteers will be committed to connecting City Hall visitors with all the services the city has to offer. They will be stationed at the first floor information desk facing Washington Street, and will be the welcoming faces as visitors enter the building Monday-Friday from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The city is looking for eligible volunteers 18 years of age and above who can commit a minimum of two shifts per month. No commercial loads, large residential quantities, medical waste, explosives or radioactive waste will be accepted. A maximum of five over-the-road-tires per resident will be accepted. No tractor or oversize tires will be allowed

Document shredding also will be offered (up to five boxes-full), along with hard drive shredding. The city is also seeking volunteers at this event.

Items not accepted: hazardous items (tires, oil-based paints, chemicals). A \$5 fee will be charged for bulky computer monitors, and \$10 for bulky TVs.

City prosecutors recognized for persistence on Woodbridge case

■ity Prosecutors BeBe Parascandola and Bob Smith were recently recognized as Arizona Prosecuting Attorneys Advisory Council Prosecutors of the Year for their work on the Woodbridge Apartments case. The case resulted in a \$2.8 million judgement against the property owner who was found

guilty on many counts after tenants were found living without air conditioning in the summer, among other deteriorating conditions. City staff was determined to bring residents relief and hold the owners accountable. The court ended up issuing a guilty verdict on 385 of the 406 criminal counts, imposing total fines of \$2.8 million.

Additionally, this is the first summer in which the city's new cooling and heating ordinance is in effect. It requires landlords to heat and cool rental properties to specific temperatures.
