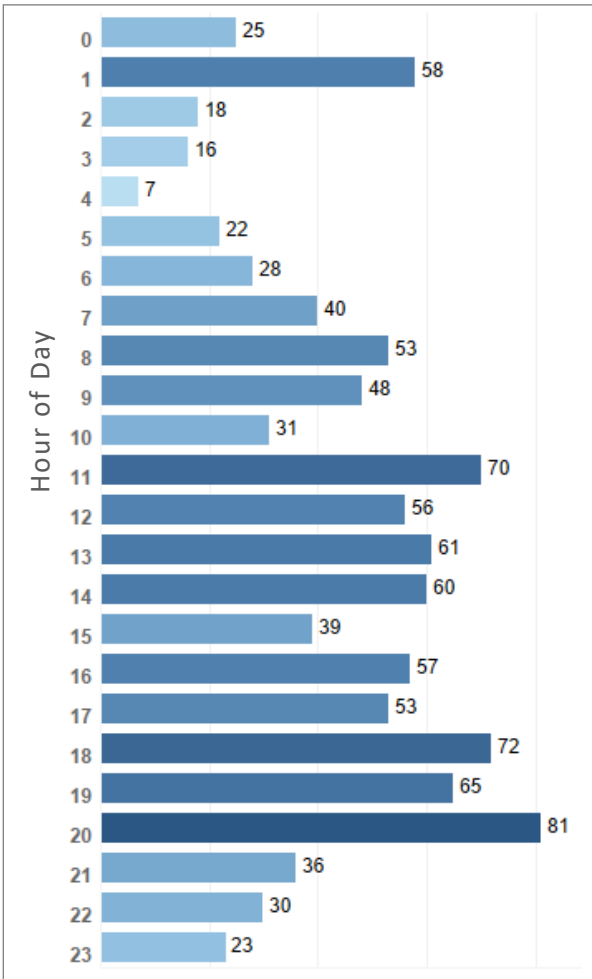

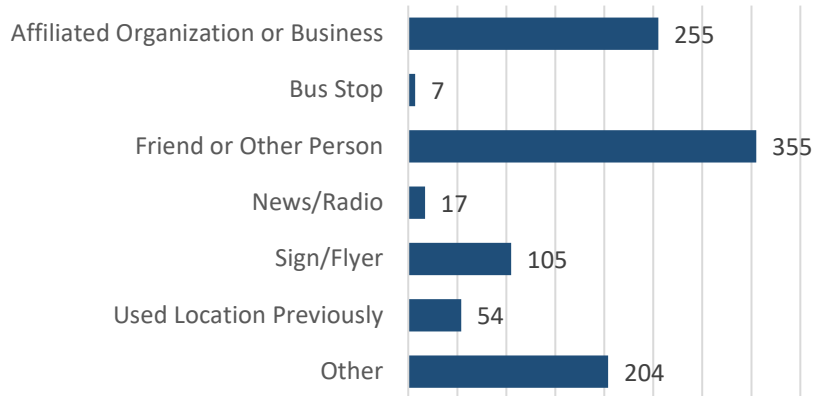
Phoenix Summer Safety Operation Totals 5/1/25 – 5/28/25:

- **109 heat related** calls for service (Source: Phoenix FD).
- **2,795 visits** in respite and extended hour cooling centers (based on intake forms received).
- Overall, **noon and between the hours of 4 and 8 pm** have seen the highest number of people arriving.
- **Walk/Bike (66%)** is the most popular method of getting to the cooling center.
- **2,137 visits (76%)** indicated they are experiencing homelessness.
- **445 visitors** received direct onsite assistance from CBI with various shelter or homeless solutions referrals. **13 visitors** required additional follow up for their referral, which was submitted by the Office of Emergency Management on their behalf.

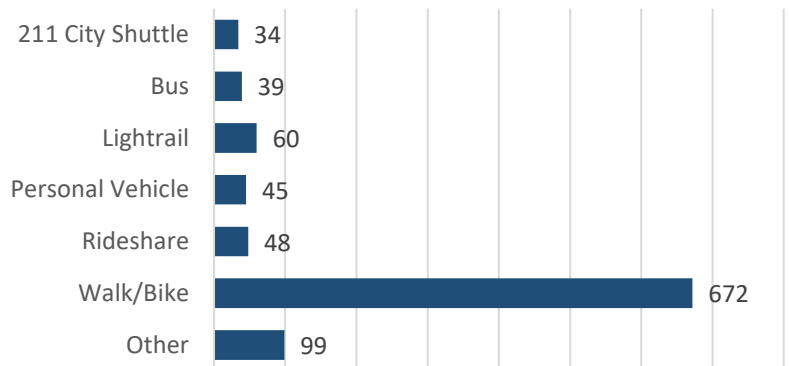
Intake Time

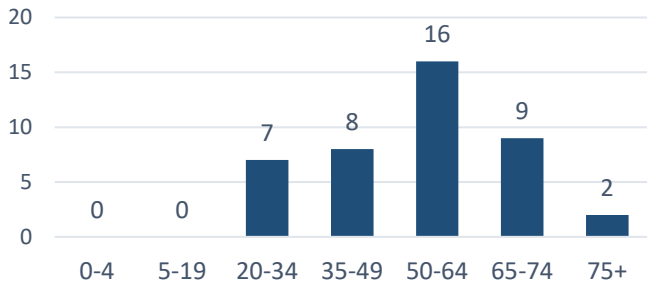

Patient Age



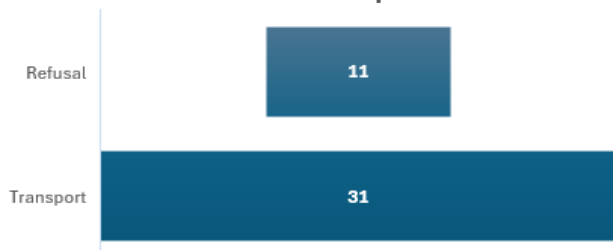

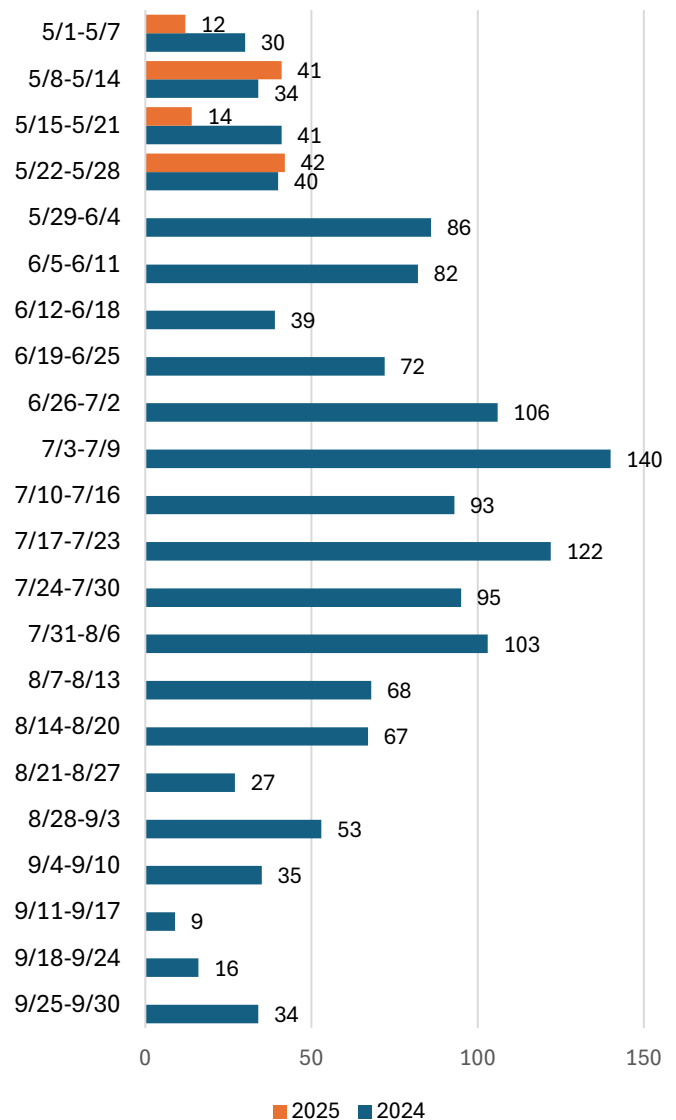

The average high for the fourth week of the heat relief operation was 103 degrees (compared to 99 degrees the same time last year).

There were 42 heat related calls for service the fourth week of the heat relief operation, 5/22-5/28 compared to 40 calls for service last year.

Comparative Calls for Service by Week



24% of patients who suffered from heat related illness were experiencing homelessness.
